

Rirkrit Tiravanija

Born in 1961, Buenos Aires, Argentina.

Lives and works in New York, U.S.A., Berlin, Germany and Chiang Mai, Thailand.

The work of Rirkrit Tiravanija has not stopped questioning the format of artworks and the exhibition system. A mix of performance, sculpture, installation, and more, with Tiravanija, the artistic space transforms into a place of social interaction, often dotted with meeting points, encounters, and exchanges. Frequently immaterial, his work invents new connections in a world based on reciprocity, conviviality, and hospitality. Whether transforming art centers and galleries into banquets, printing workshops, or pirate radio stations, the artist enjoys overcoming the usual spatial and temporal limitations of the “white cube.”

More solo exhibitions include Musée d’art moderne de la Ville de Paris (2005); Los Angeles County Museum of Art (1999); Philadelphia Museum of Art (1998); Museum of Modern Art, New York (1997); and Reiña Sofia, Madrid (1994).

Tiravanija’s work has also been included in major exhibitions such as the Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum in New York (2008); São Paulo Biennial (2006); Liverpool Biennial (2002 and 2004); Whitney Biennial (1995 and 2005); Venice Biennale (1993 and 1999).

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Le travail de Rirkrit Tiravanija ne cesse de questionner le format des œuvres d'art et le système de l'exposition. Un mélange de performance, de sculpture, d'installation, où l'espace artistique se transforme en un lieu d'interaction sociale, souvent parsemé de points de rencontres et échanges. Le plus souvent immatériel, son travail invente de nouvelles connexions dans un monde fondé sur la réciprocité, la convivialité et l'hospitalité. Que ce soit la transformation de centres et galeries d'art en banquets, ateliers d'impression, ou stations de radio pirates, l'artiste s'applique à dépasser les limites spatiales et temporelles habituelles du «white cube».
