New York – What the Body Can Do: Open Sessions 11 captures the movement and potential of individual bodies in collective action. The artists in this exhibition dissect spectacles of war, memorialize immigrant and refugee narratives, and savor protest cinema. The exhibition features artists Danielle Dean, Olalekan Jeyifous, Jennifer May Reiland, Slinko, and Hồng-An Trương. Dean's animations indicate the ever accelerated consumption-driven life under digital capitalism; Jeyifous's images meditate on imperialist architecture, urban ephemera, and the mundane; telephone screens, mirrors, and the camera's eye are a window into Reiland's versions of biblical and mythological tales; bread figures embody uprising and rebellion in Slinko's large storyboard drawings; and Trương's installations display a historical perspective of the Asian American activist movement in the United States, which includes the most recent civil rights struggle.

PUBLIC PROGRAMS

What the Body Can Do: Open Sessions 11 will present a public performance centered around the god Hephaestus. A crippled blacksmith originally hailing from classical mythology, he acts as a figure provoking the audience to consider the relationship between disabilities and our own bodies. Drawing from classical and modern texts ranging from Aeschylus's Prometheus Bound, to a letter written by Samuel Beckett, this updated Hephaestus will challenge the "racist and xenophobic" notions of race and beauty from the past.

OPEN SESSIONS

Open Sessions is a hybrid exhibition/residency program organized by Lisa Sigal and Rosario Güiraldes, Open Sessions Curators. It provides unique opportunities for selected artists to find new approaches for contextualizing and exhibiting their work through exhibitions, public programs, workshops, and working dinners. The artists selected for Open Sessions may or may not draw as their primary means of art-making. The two-year program engages musicians, architects, dancers, poets—anyone who is interested in expanding the boundaries of drawing. Open Sessions artists work together to create a dynamic, continuous conversation, viewing drawing as an activity rather than a product.
