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INTRODUCTION

A leading international art institution, NTU CCA Singapore is a platform, host and partner creating and driven by dynamic thinking in its three-fold constellation: Exhibitions, Residencies Programme, and Research and Academic Education. A national research centre for contemporary art of Nanyang Technological University, the Centre focuses on Spaces of the Curatorial. It brings forth innovative and experimental forms of artistic and curatorial practices that intersect the present and histories of contemporary art embedded in social-political spheres with other fields of knowledge.

NTU CCA Singapore positions itself as a space for critical discourse and encourages new ways of thinking about Spaces of the Curatorial in Southeast Asia and beyond. As a research centre, we aim to provide visiting researchers and curators a comprehensive platform to study contemporary art ecosystems in Singapore and the region.

Part of the research and academic programmes arm is the Public Resource Platform, which includes the research library, contemporary artist files, and video documentation. The artist files aim to provide an entry point to contemporary artistic practice in Southeast Asia, containing visual material and audio recordings of talks from over 90 local artists and NTU CCA Singapore's Artists-in-Residence. The video documentation gives insight into past public events of the Centre, offering an expanded understanding of the complexity and diversity of contemporary art production, and how it intersects with current developments in culture, society, and politics.

Facilitating the production of knowledge and research, the Centre's Residencies Programme invites both local and international artists, curators, and researchers. Our seven studios support the artistic process in the most direct way by giving Artists-in-Residence the time and resources to be fully engaged with their research, and access to an immersive context for developing ideas.

Since its inauguration in October 2013, NTU CCA Singapore has featured leading Singaporean and international artists, presenting their work for the first time in Southeast Asia. This approach makes the Centre one of the few spaces in Singapore to present contemporary art from around the globe. As an institution, we have dynamic public programmes such as lectures, workshops, open studios, film screenings, Exhibition (de)Tours, and Stagings, that engage with various audiences.

SPACES OF THE CURATORIAL

NTU CCA Singapore seeks to question the future of "curating," a term commonly associated with the exhibition format. What are the infrastructures and modes of presenting and discussing artistic production in diverse cultural settings, in particular throughout Southeast Asia's vastly changing societies? NTU CCA Singapore's exhibition spaces, designed by artist and curator Fareed Armaly, respond to this curatorial framework to unfold different juxtaposing formats.

THE EXHIBITION HALL is the main space of curatorial engagement.

THE LAB serves as a platform presenting research-in-progress.

THE SINGLE SCREEN features moving image, film programmes, and presentations.

THE VITRINE is a window display for spontaneous encounters between objects and the transient viewer.

THE SEMINAR ROOM is dedicated to education and workshops to directly engage with audiences.

CLIMATES. HABITATS. ENVIRONMENTS. (2017 – 2020)

NTU CCA Singapore's overarching research topic informs and connects the Centre's various activities. Changes in the environment influence weather patterns and these climatic shifts impact habitats, and vice versa. Precarious conditions of habitats are forcing migration of humans and other species at a critical level. The consequences of human intervention are felt on a global scale, affecting geopolitical, social, and cultural systems. The Centre intends to discuss and understand these realties through art and culture in dialogue with other fields of knowledge.

Climates. Habitats. Environments. follows *PLACE.LABOUR.CAPITAL.* (2015–2017) and continues to address the complexities and the dynamics that entangle the local with the global.

EXHIBITIONS

NTU CCA Singapore's exhibitions focus on contemporary artistic production that provides a critical platform for reflection and discussion. We present up to four exhibitions a year ranging from group to solo shows, giving voice to a diversity of local and international artists. Each exhibition is accompanied by an extensive public programme of tours, talks and workshops that foster reflections on the exhibition from various perspectives and disciplines.

Non-Aligned brought together three movingimage works by John Akomfrah, Naeem Mohaiemen and The Otolith Group that inquired into the challenging transition periods from British colonial rule to the independence of nations. The various colonial territories, spanning from Asia to Australia, from Africa to America to the Caribbean, gained their sovereignty and independence at different times. These processes of decolonisation played out in the histories of nations, but also determined the lives of individuals.

Taking NTU CCA Singapore's overarching research topic *Climates. Habitats. Environments.* as point of departure, the most recent exhibition *The Posthuman City. Climates. Habitats. Environments.* considered the possibilities of a conscious sharing of resources, and a mindful coexistence between humans and other species. The selected works engaged with issues of sustainability, water scarcity, invisible communities, nature as a form of culture, and suggested the implementation of lived indigenous knowledges. Our exhibitions have seen notable guests including former President of the Republic of Kiribati, **His Excellency Mr Anote Tong** who visited *The Oceanic* and shared his experiences as a climate activist. The Centre also hosted **Francesca von Habsburg**, Founder and Chairwoman of Thyssen-Bornemisza Art Contemporary (TBA21), on the same occasion.

In 2017, the exhibition *Ghosts and Spectres* – *Shadows of History* featuring **Apichatpong Weerasethakul** (Thailand), **Ho Tzu Nyen** (Singapore), **Nguyen Trinh Thi** (Vietnam), and **Park Chan-kyong** (South Korea) was named one of the best exhibitions in 2017 by Artforum and ArtAsiaPacific.

RESIDENCIES PROGRAMME

The Residencies programme is an integral part of the NTU CCA Singapore's mission as a research centre. It has hosted more than 190 artists, curators, critics, and scholars from Singapore and abroad. The studiobased Residencies programme is dedicated to facilitating the research of established and emerging artists. It serves as a forum for cultural and artistic exchange in Southeast Asia, augmented with public events ranging from open studio sessions, lectures, live performances, and special projects in The Lab, NTU CCA Singapore's space for curatorial experimentation.

More than 80 curators located around the globe serve as nominators. Based on the submitted research proposal for the residency, the selection committee, comprising representatives from various local art institutions, decide on the artists for each residency cycle. Curators, writers, and critics are invited directly for a one to two-week residency at NTU CCA Singapore based on their research into the local and regional art ecosystem, contributing to the Centre's core focus on Spaces of the Curatorial.

Recently, NTU CCA Singapore organised Residencies OPEN as part of Singapore Art Week which offered a rare insight into the artists-in-residence's studios. Through discussions, performances, installations, and presentations of works-in-progress, Residencies OPEN showcased the diversity of contemporary art practices from around the globe and the divergent ways artists conceive an artwork with the studio as a constant space for experimentation and research.

ARTISTS-IN-RESIDENCE FOR 2020/21

NTU CCA Singapore is currently in the seventh cycle (April 2020–March 2021) of its Residencies Programme, hosting over 20 artists from Asia, Europe, Middle East, North and South America.

C RESEARCH COLLABORATIONS

Mapletree Investments Pte Ltd

NTU CCA Singapore and the real estate developer Mapletree have joined efforts in a unique collaboration that brought public art to the local community. This Public Art Education Programme included four commissioned public installations featuring **Dan Graham** (United States), **Zulkifle Mahmod** (Singapore), **Tomás Saraceno** (Argentina/Germany), and **Yinka Shonibare CBE (RA)** (Nigeria/United Kingdom), at Mapletree Business City II. This was the first time a corporation has provided resources for a public art institute to create an art education programme within a corporate environment.

Thyssen-Bornemisza Art Contemporary– Academy's (TBA21) *The Current*

Organised in three-year cycles, TBA21-Academy's The Current is a multiphase fellowship that provides artists, curators, scientists, and other cultural producers a platform to cultivate transdisciplinary practices and foster the exchange of ideas. The Current was conceived to raise awareness for today's most urgent ecological, social, and economic issues. Avoiding the structures of conventional conferences, think tanks, or residencies, The Current seeks to re-imagine knowledge production and the methods in which we present, understand, and exchange information. NTU CCA Singapore's collaboration with TBA21-Academy's The Current began in 2015 and concluded in mid-2018.

Afterall

In 2017, NTU CCA Singapore joined the editorial team of *Afterall* journal for a threeyear research and publishing partnership. Initiated in 1998, *Afterall* journal focuses on artistic and cultural production in relation to broader theoretical, social, and political contexts. NTU CCA Singapore actively contributed to the expansion of *Afterall* journal's cultural conversations and research in Southeast Asia.

PUBLIC PROGRAMMES

As a research centre, the NTU CCA Singapore is dedicated to knowledge production, critical discourse and the exchange of ideas. The Centre's dynamic public programmes serve to engage with various audiences through lectures, workshops, film screenings, Exhibition (de)Tours and Stagings. By collaborating with artists and cultural practitioners from diverse fields of knowledge, the public programme aims to provide points of entry to engage with the key themes of exhibitions as well as various artists' practices.

The Exhibition de(tour) lecture series aims to expand on adjacent ideas to those being explored within the centre's ongoing exhibitions. Most recently, in conjunction with the exhibition The Posthuman City, the centre organised an Exhibition (de)Tour with Olivo Miotto titled Germ Warfare - the balancing game between Humans, Pathogens, and Environment. During his talk, he shared his research about the genomic epidemiology of malaria parasites, and the evolution of antimalarial drug resistance, while trying to tackle the question: can humanity create a disease-free future while protecting the environment?

Similarly, the Centre collaborates with artists featured in the exhibitions as well as local initiatives to run interactive workshops that encourage a more tangible understanding of themes relevant to the centre's overarching research topic. In January 2020, Animali Domestici, the design duo behind Bangkok Opportunistic Ecologies, ran a Mapping workshop incorporating different graphic composition techniques when forming narratives of urban metropolitan environments. In keeping with current ideas of waste reduction, ZeroWaste Food Singapore, a new local advocate for zero-waste living, organised a workshop where participants were taught how to upcycle fruit waste to create their own non-toxic multipurpose cleaning solution.

NTU CCA Singapore's Film programme builds upon the cultural discourses relevant to the Centre's research and exhibitions. For The Posthuman City, the Centre ran an accompanying film programme which involved a selection of 11 artists' films, as well as two sci-fi classics.

CONFERENCES & SYMPOSIA

NTU CCA Singapore organises a rigorous programme of conferences and symposia, bringing together leading academics, researchers and arts practitioners, and providing them with an interdisciplinary space for the exchange of information and ideas.

The Posthuman City. Climates. Habitats. Environments, included two seminars deepening the discussion around posthumanism and the urban condition. The first, titled Techno-optimism and Eco-Hacktivism, had lectures and presentations by artists and academics covering topics ranging from the future of the changing bioscience tech industry to the possibilities of exploiting termite behaviour for economic gain. The second symposium, Biodiver-city and Urban Futures featured Jason Farago, art critic for the New York Times, whose talk considered how artists and curators have approached urbanisation, climate change and extinction in the 21st century. Thinking through the coexistence of species and the city as a habitat for diverse life forms, there was also a panel discussion consisting of artists, researchers, and practitioners for whom interspecies interaction is at the core of their practice.

Additionally, NTU CCA Singapore presented Art, Urban Change, and the Public Sphere: Public Art Education Summit, the first of its kind in Singapore and part of an initiative to promulgate knowledge on public art. The Summit was held in association with the Shanghai Academy of Fine Arts, Shanghai University, and the Institute for Public Arts, London; and supported by Mapletree Investments as well as the Public Art Trust, an initiative of the National Arts Council Singapore.

NTU CCA IDEAS FEST

NTU CCA Ideas Fest is a platform to catalyse the critical exchange of ideas and encourage thinking outside the box. It is a bottom-up approach linking the artistic and the academic with community groups and grassroots initiatives. The pilot edition, Cities for People (2016–17), expanded on artistic interventions and engaged with contemporary issues such as air, water, food, environment, and social interaction in connection to artistic and cultural fields, academic research, and design applications. The second iteration, IdeasCity Singapore (2020), coincided with the exhibition The Posthuman City. Climates. Habitats. Environments. and was guest-curated by IdeasCity, New Museum, New York.

In 2020, the Centre organised an Online Benefit Art Auction featuring artworks donated by local and international artists who have collaborated with the Centre's programmes. All funds raised will go towards supporting two major projects, both of which capture NTU CCA's activities, our exhibitions, and our commitment to the urgencies of our time as addressed in works of art: The NTU CCA Singapore Digital Archive and the publication Climates. Habitats. Environments. Our Inaugural Fundraising Gala took place in 2016, with the support of Phillips Hong Kong, and second Online Benefit Auction was held in October 2018 as part of our 5th Anniversary Celebration.

CULTURAL MATCHING FUND

In 2018, NTU CCA Singapore became eligible for the Ministry of Culture, Community and Youth's Cultural Matching Fund. By matching every dollar raised by the Centre via donations, this fund allows us to maximise cash support received from individuals, foundations, and corporations.
