Born 1981, Granges-Marnand, Switzerland / Lives and works in Geneva, Switzerland and London UK.

Denis Savary works across forms and media in his creation of dreamlike objects, images and installations. Often reinterpreting motifs and relics from throughout history, he twists them formally and psychologically through shifts in scale and material, craft and content, towards a contorted total and piecemeal reimagination of culture.



Galerie Maria Bernheim LONDON is pleased to present Ventimiglia, an exhibition of new works by Denis Savary.

Exuding the artist's eclectic and versatile multifaceted practice, this new series of sculptures embraces his ability to push the material to its limits. In this exhibition, his new works represent a continuum in his overall sculptural projects, referencing art historical and literary heritage while actively responding to the environment of the gallery, with its striking floor and classical architecture.

Multicolored blown glass works will hang like polymorphous chandeliers in the gallery space. Denis Savary employs the formal language of sculpture with an emphasis on geometry and colors through the traditional medium of glass, paying homage to artists such as Duchamp and Sophie Taueber Arp but also to a painterly conception of color field, where the sculpture exists outside of itself through the play on light and shadows.

As often in his oeuvre, this series is simultaneously imbued with themes and images of old-world tales, where temptation and salvation represent two pieces of the same puzzle. The play on light and transparency mixes kitsch with a romantic Raphaelite idea of landscape, whilst creating an immersive environment for the viewer, transporting them to a small village on the Italian coast. The clear references to the Memphis Group and Ettore Sottsass are less of an homage than a disassembly, pulling apart all the elements and recreating an extraordinary form. Whether they take different shapes as hanging installations or as intimate design sculptures, Savary's sculpture imply secret narratives and always evolving histories.

This exhibition runs concurrently to Savary's solo exhibition at the Kunsthalle St Gallen in Switzerland. Denis Savary has been the subject of numerous solo exhibitions in international institutions and recently at the Musée de la Chaux de Fonds, Switzerland, Museo Pietro Canonica, Rome and MAMCO in Geneva.


TECHNIQUE INTRODUCTION & MINOR INFLUENCES

As always in Savary's oeuvre, the artist explores ancestral techniques and brings them to new limits. This traditional technique called "bousillé" was used by glass workers, which consisted in recycling the left over materials to create little objects to bring home to their families. With this series, this savoir faire is elevated to create sculptures that resemble jewels. The shapes of these elements to which the artist refers to as Charms, also allude to a more industrial production of glass, such as glass insulators for electrical networks but also imagery referring to robots and cyborgs, similar to the R2-D2 in Star-Wars.

Created as an in situ installation, taking into consideration the historical elements of the Mount Street space, brings an atmosphere that is reminiscent of a set of jewels in a giant box, but also of a beach in Ventimiglia. Italian landscapes is at the core of his vision, as the viewer is immediately transported to Murano and its glassblowers upon entering the exhibition space.

Savary explores folklore legends, such as the one reported by the Roman author Plinio, which recounts that glass was discovered by Phoenician merchants who had just landed on the shores of the river Belus. As they were heating their food on the fire, they took pieces of rocks found on the beach to create a pot. Under the effect of heat, the rock mixed with sand was transformed into an unknown and translucent material: glass. Inspired by Christina Rossetti, sister of the Pre-Raphaelite painter Dante Gabriel Rossetti and her poem "Goblin Market", Savary reinterprets her goblins as Charms, coloured spirits, sublime creature shining in the sun, yet monstruous.

His research into this display of bodies springs from the avant-garde abstraction of Oscar




Schlemmer's Triadic Ballet, exploring a deconstructed idea of body elements, arranging a choreography on the emblematic gallery floor.




SOPHIE TAEUBER-ARP

For the series of puppets dating from 1918, Taeuber-Arp proposed an adaptation of The Deer King by Carlo Gozzi (1720-1806), and made a radical break with the puppet tradition and created seventeen puppets, none of which were miniature replicas of human beings, rather they were based on constructive aesthetics.


This new series furthers his interest in the world of DADA. In 2016, Denis Savary was invited to imagine a dance project for the DADA Jubilee for the Cabaret Voltaire in Zürich as well as at the EMST museum in Athens, in which he displayed a puppet by Taeuber - the Guard or Robot King - transformed into a sculpture by professional puppeteer. ETTORE SOTTSASS

An important part of Ettore Sotssass' works are his glass sculptures. He began creating them in the early 1980's, challenging the traditions of Murano glassmaking, combining materials such as glass, plastic and polycarbonates and bringing them to life.

Within the Memphis Group, founded by the architect in 1981, of particular interest for the artist is Martine Bedin's 1981 Super Lamp. Playfully shaped like a stylized car, this piece featured two wheels at the bottom of its half-circular blue silhouette, while the edges were adorned with six bulb holders in pink, green, blue, yellow and red.

These new Charms take from both the complexity and depth of Sotssass' work and the liveliness Bedin's Lamp, elevating the pieces to beings made of many elements that create a lively yet imaginary world.

HOPI KATCHNA DOLLS and JACQUES CALLOT GROTESSQUE ENGRAVINGS

Kachina dolls, also knowns as katsina dolls, are symbolic and ceremonial Native American gifts. Traditionally given to Hopi girls during infancy and as they grow up, the dolls are a significant aspect of Native American culture. The word "kachina" comes from the Hopi word "kachi," which means "spirit." Kachina dolls symbolize spirits of nature.



The rare series of dwarf caricatures by Jacques Callot , first published in 1616, also serves as inspiration. The Callotto Resuscitato, which appeared in several slightly

different editions, can be found not only in printed graphics, but also in garden sculptures, porcelain paintings and figures, wall paintings, wallpapers, wood and ivory carvings. The characters appear in the elaborate dresses and hairstyles of early Baroque Europe, showing the trades and scenes of daily life of that period.
