Jaywalk to pop inside the Dollarama because you need a flathead screwdriver and some super glue. Get coffee at a coffee shop that does indeed sell coffee. You spot a man there reading the Umberto Eco detective novel you were thinking about earlier today. Leave and head the same way and turn left down a small street across from “Frenzy Tours” travel agency. Run into Malcolm who informs you, “there is a sale on Wednesday”. As you depart from Malcolm you continue forward and get a phone call from your therapist (you forgot you had a session scheduled for today). While on the phone with him you turn right at the pharmacy and walk halfway up the block. On your left you arrive at the gallery.

100 Bell Towers is pleased to present an exhibition by Los Angeles-based artist Johann Mun titled *Buzzers*. Presented are a series of 9+1 photographs printed on metallic paper. Green, red, yellow, blue and black stripes are silk-screened vertically on the matte boards.
