Hand+Made: The Performative Impulse in Art and Craft May 15–July 25, 2010

HOUSTON, TX (April 28, 2010)—Hand+Made: The Performative Impulse in Art and Craft is a dynamic group exhibition that explores the innovative means by which artists continue to expand the traditional boundaries of art and craft. Through the integration of performance, the artists featured in this exhibition have broadened the context of craft for contemporary times. The Contemporary Arts Museum Houston will present sculptural objects, environments, and site-specific installations along with photography and video, documenting performances, as well as a series of live performance events.

Performance and the incorporation of spectacle in the works featured becomes a catalyst toward the creation of new forms that challenge the traditional ideas of art rooted in the handmade. Participating artists include the collaborative group B Team, Conrad Bakker, Nick

Cave, Cat Chow, Sonya Clark, Gabriel Craig, Theaster Gates, Cynthia Giachetti, Ryan Gothrup, Sabrina Gschwandtner, Lauren Kalman, Christy Matson, James Melchert, Yuka Otani, Sheila Pepe, Michael Rea, Anne Wilson, Saya Woolfalk, and Bohyun Yoon.

The artists in this exhibition have either sought to animate the handmade object by using it as an instrument of performance; deepen the impact of the object by broadening its interpretation through public interventions and interactive objects; or, through objects that are created as residual of public performances. Collectively, they embody the unconventional within their respective fields, breaking new ground into areas of presentation, representation, and meaning.

Hand+Made features several new works, including a Book of the Month Club series of exchangeable sculpture by Conrad Bakker; a new series of Soundsuits by Nick Cave; two site-specific installations; and performances by Gabriel Craig, Theaster Gates, Cynthia Giachetti, and Anne Wilson. Performance event highlights include a lecturedemonstration by Nick Cave; public interventions by Pro Bono Jeweler Gabriel Craig, in various locations throughout the city; knitting nights for audiences to unravel the installation created by Sheila Pepe; a restaging of a 1972 happening by pioneering ceramic artist James Melchert; an endurance performance by Anne Wilson in collaboration with Hope Stone Dance Company; and a musical performance by Theaster Gates with a local Houston choir co-presented by the Houston Museum of African American Culture. The exhibition will close with a performance/ceremony by Cynthia Giachetti. The Museum will use webstreaming to share these events with broader audiences.

The exhibition, curated by CAMH Curator Valerie Cassel Oliver, consists of twenty works created using materials that range from fiber to glass and wood to metal. *Hand+Made* breaks new ground on the current dialogue surrounding practices within art, craft, and design, through the lens of performance.

PUBLICATION

Hand+Made: The Performative Impulse in Art and Craft is organized by Valerie Cassel Oliver, curator for the Contemporary Arts Museum Houston, and is accompanied by a fully illustrated catalogue. The publication includes contributions by Cassel Oliver, as well as guest contributors, Namita Gupta Wiggers, curator, Museum of Contemporary Craft Portland, Oregon, and Glenn Adamson, Head of Graduate Studies, Research Department, Victoria & Albert Museum in London. The catalogue will also include an exhibition checklist, color reproductions of featured works, and artists' biographies and a general bibliography. The publication is designed by Don Quaintance of Public Address Design and distributed by Distributed Art Publishers (D.A.P.).

Artist Theaster Gates performs A Closer Walk with Thee (2010), a choral piece that is part of his installation for Hand+Made. Gates creates, in his own words, "sculpture, performance, space, and friendship." In Dave: A Legendary Black Clay Superhero and A Closer Walk with Thee (both 2010 and on view at CAMH), Gates provides a stage for his own music inspired by the writings of Dave the Potter, a slave born in South Carolina at the beginning of the nineteenth century who made pots for the plantation he served. Using the words Dave inscribed on the necks of the pots-his name, biblical verses, and couplets—Gates has created a choral piece, with lyrics in call-and-response form, with Dave's prompts and Gates's replies. The installation of A Closer Walk with Thee consists of speakers and a turntable, both made of porcelain, which play a recording of the piece. Gates will be joined by a Houston choir for his live performance. Co-presented by the Houston Museum of African American Culture.

Sunday, July 24, 2-3pm

Celebrate the closing of *Hand+Made* with a performance by Cynthia Giachetti. Integrating junkshop objects— rusted forks, spoons, knives, finials— into her own handmade ceramics, Giachetti creates sculptures that invoke a spiritual reverence for death and a sense of gratitude for what exists and what can be experienced. For her performance, *Flower Ceremony* (2010), the artist will give away the flowers from *Still Life* (2010), a massive ceramic chandelier created for the exhibition made up of many floral elements.
