OXY ARTS Presents Kenturah Davis: Dark Illumination

For the culmination of her residency at OXY ARTS, Occidental College, and in her first institutional exhibition in Los Angeles, Kenturah Davis presents a solo show of work that illuminates the significance of shadows in our sensory experience.

(January 18, 2023 – Los Angeles, CA) – OXY ARTS, Occidental College's public art space rooted in social justice and community engagement, is pleased to announce *Kenturah Davis: Dark Illumination*, a solo exhibition by **Kenturah Davis**, an artist working in Los Angeles and Accra (Ghana) whose work oscillates between various facets of portraiture and design. Using text as a point of departure, Davis explores the fundamental role that language has in shaping how we understand ourselves and the world around us.

In *Dark Illumination*, her first solo institutional exhibition in Los Angeles, Davis draws inspiration from Jun'ichirō Tanizaki's classic text, *In Praise of Shadows*. Using photography, printmaking, installation and hybrid sculptural forms, Davis experiments with various modalities that interrogate the nature of the contingent relationship between shadow and light, and contemplates the premise that shadows and darkness do not just produce conditions that conceal, but that they can also reveal and illuminate. Davis'

practice extends to questions and explorations that help unpack social and cultural conventions and hierarchies, and considers ideas rooted in philosophy, physics, literature and anthropology.

Davis' work was recently highlighted in the Smithsonian exhibition, <u>Portrait of a Nation: 2022 Honorees</u>, honoring contemporary Americans who have made significant contributions across diverse fields. Davis was commissioned to produce the portrait of acclaimed filmmaker Ava DuVernay. Davis' work can also be seen in the public sphere along the recently opened L.A. Metro K Line. <u>Sonder</u> is a multi-panel piece sited at the above-ground Inglewood station stop.

Dark Illumination is the culmination of Davis' term as the **2022 Wanlass Artist in Residence** at OXY ARTS—the only college residency in the country where the artist is invited to develop a completely original curriculum based on their practice and interests. The exhibition is on view **February 9-April 29**, **2023** in Los Angeles.

Following the exhibition, OXY ARTS will publish a catalog that will be released at the end of 2023.

Kenturah Davis lives and works in Los Angeles and Accra. The artist earned her BA from Occidental College and MFA from Yale University School of Art.

The Los Angeles Metro Rail commissioned a large-scale, site-specific work by Davis that is now permanently installed on the new Crenshaw/LAX, K Line station. Other public projects include Four Women, a commissioned mural by Alliance Francaise to commemorate International Women's Day, in Accra, and Metamorphose, comprised of five portraits commissioned by architect Elliott Barnes, featured in Barnes' installation at the Lâ Exposition AD Interieurs, Paris, France.

The artist was an inaugural artist fellow at NXTHVN in New Haven, founded by Titus Kaphar and Jonathan Brand and a DAMLI fellow at the Cleveland Museum of Art. Davis is the current Wanlass Artist in Residence at Occidental College and an inaugural cohort for Dorchester Industries Experimental Design Lab, by Theaster Gates and Prada.

The Wanlass Artist in Residence is Occidental's year-long residency program that allows an artist to investigate aspects of their practice and share it with the College campus-wide. The program encourages cross-campus collaboration and thoughtful sustained interaction between artists and students.
