Contemporary And (C&)

The C& Center of Unfinished Business is a roving reading room and discussion-based program organized by the multimedia platform Contemporary And (C&). Conceived by C& co-founders and artistic directors Julia Grosse and Yvette Mutumba, the Center of Unfinished Business investigates the enduring legacies and repercussions of various forms of colonialism and imperialism. The project was launched in 2017 and has since traveled to art spaces and museums around the world.

For the CAC iteration, two towering bookshelves offer a curated selection of groundbreaking books drawn from C&'s library, the CAC's own holdings, and local bookstore Smith and Hannon. Included texts range from the science fiction novel *The Word For World is Forest* by Ursula Le Guin to the exhibition catalogue *Black Radical Women 1965-85*. The result is an eclectic mix of writing that form an alternative bibliography. These publications reflect upon the failures of modernism and Eurocentric thinking, while imagining a new canon of decolonial propositions for a more equitable future.

The project is accompanied by a series of discussions led by Chandra Frank and organized around specific texts, including *Undrowned* (Alexis Pauline Gumbs), *Lose your Mother* (Saidiya Hartman), and *Familiar Stranger* (Stuart Hall). Through the selection of significant and at times unsettling texts, the installation highlights the ubiquitous traces of colonialism that extend throughout all facets of contemporary life.

Le Guin's *The Word for World is Forest.* Participants will receive printed-out copies of readings. No pre-reading is required, and refreshments will be provided. Ask Yourself

1	The Center of Unfinished Business is just that—unfinished. The organizers, C&, see it as an ongoing process because colonialism is an ongoing process. What books or questions would you add to the installation?
2	C& uses a reading room to inspire visitors to think about colonialism, its past, present, and lasting impact. Where do you find inspiration to think through the social justice issues we face?
3	The books that C& collects and includes in the installation may not seem, at first sight, to be readily connected to colonialism. As you peruse the collection, what questions do you have? How might you go about exploring those questions?
