
Alexandros Lindsay 12'D October 1– November 4, 2023

12'D is a solo exhibition by Twin Cities-based artist Alexandros Lindsay that is anchored by a monumental carousel: a kinetic sculpture which operates as a cinema and a structure for the viewer to sit on and watch the digital film as the piece spins clockwise in the room. The dual projection is set at different angles—one which is static at eye level, a projection on a flat screen with close-up video that is synchronized with the revolutions of the sculpture—and the other which projects around the room, above the horizon, with panning and tilting shots of the corners of each different built environment. Utilizing entry point and rhythmic timing techniques like that of Sean Gladwell and Stan Brackage, Lindsay has engineered an experiential work that relates to its site and setting, and which further elaborates on the artist's research into movement (cinematic, biographical, cultural) and facilitates the experience of sitting still, yet moving, seeing one's environment change around them.

12'D by Alexandros Lindsay is the artist's first solo exhibition with Good Weather and is on view until November 4, 2023, with gallery hours on Thursdays, Fridays, and Saturdays from 1–6 p.m. or by appointment.

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Alexandros Lindsay (b. 1983 Minneapolis, Minnesota) is an artist who uses mixed media to explore subjects overlooked in American society. His process of moving cultural symbols to different contexts frees them from their pre-existing meaning and opens them up for new interpretation. Lindsay was awarded the 2015 McKnight Fellowship, 2nd place in Installation at the 2011 Florence Biennale, and was a 2013 Jerome Fellow at Franconia Sculpture Park. He has exhibited in shows both nationally and internationally including a solo show at the Casket Arts Building and a group exhibition at the Weisman Art Museum. He has a BFA from the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston and MFA from Cranbrook Academy of Art, Bloomfield Hills.
