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The Flowering of the Strange Orchid' takes its title from the short story by H.G Wells (1894) written during the Orchidelerium of Victorian era England. Upper classes feverishly collected rare exotic orchids renowned for their curious beauty and magic allure. In Well's gothic story, an orchidphile purchases a mysterious budding orchid that was collected from a remote island. When the orchid blooms after obsessive cultivation, it omits an intense overpowering perfume and its long tendrils begin feeding on the blood of its possessor.

Yukio Mishima, in his novel 'Forbidden Colours' (1951), claims "Beauty is something that burns the hand when you touch it." Similarly, Romanticism of the 19th century contended that when we come into contact with beauty, we may feel joy or love, but equally terror, melancholy, or leave the encounter overwhelmed. Orchidelirium caused multiple orchid varieties to become extinct and often orchids brought back to England putrefied before they could blossom. The pursuit of beauty can turn ugly, and often what is truly beautiful also contains within it something sickly.

The work in this exhibition touches on sensuous experience of both the human and nature. Its beauty and romance, as well as this dark shadow.
