Mirage

GLEB AMANKULOV, WISRAH C. V. DA R. CELESTINO, KEVIN JEROME EVERSON, PHILIPP FLEISCHMANN

The word 'mirage' is derived from the French verb 'se mirer', meaning 'to mirror' or ' to reflect'. It was adopted into the English language in the early 19th century and describes fascinating optical illusions that arise from complex atmospheric conditions and often appear hallucinatory.

The group exhibition *Mirage* brings together works by artists from different generations and backgrounds who resist clear categorization in various media such as film, object, and installation. In this ambiguity, a subtle form of resistance unfolds, attempting to free artistic practices from the expectation of straightforwardness and clear classification. Although the works presented are characterized by facets of abstraction aimed at conveying ideas and concepts through striking visual moments, they still unfold a deeper narrative dimension. This often reveals the artists' perspectives on the world.

The works of Philipp Fleischmann and Kevin Jerome Everson result from an intense engagement with the analog 16mm film format, through which they explore the different dimensions of the medium and present them in the exhibition as large-scale installations. While Philipp Fleischmann examines the concept of *Queer Abstraction* with the series *Film Sculptures* (2022) and deals with non-linear forms of visibility and temporality, Kevin Jerome Everson's work focuses on the observation of everyday phenomena, shaped by his perspective as an African American on the world. His black-and-white film *Condor* (2019), shown in the opulent mirror hall of the Villa Salve Hospes, depicts a solar eclipse that was visible in Chile in 2019 in real-time. In just a few minutes, the moon moves in front of the sun, plunging the image into darkness. Eventually, the moon moves on, and the sun fully illuminates the scene again, creating a play between the colors black and white.

The works of Gleb Amankulov and Wisrah C. V. da R. Celestino also always reflect their own life circumstances and the reality of the institution where they exhibit. Amankulov's sculptures, which could also be described as assemblages, consist of objects that the artist collects at the exhibition site. His artistic



approach is characterized by conceptual openness, allowing him to continuously adapt to the local conditions and let them speak for themselves.

For his work, he engaged intensively with the art association and particularly explored the attic of the Villa Salve Hospes. There, he discovered old, unused furniture and inventory of the house. Through this site-specific approach, the house itself becomes a kind of 'main actor' within the exhibition, referencing its past as a privately used residence. As with his other presentations, the sculptures are created only for the duration of the exhibition; after it ends, they are dismantled into their individual components and returned to their original place. Through this approach, Amankulov also undermines the notion of the value and permanence of artworks.

Wisrah C. V. da R. Celestino, in her artistic practice, deals with her own biography, the remnants of transatlantic colonialism, as well as the value and status of artworks. Her work *Peso* (Portuguese for 'weight') consists of 120 metal containers filled with municipal water, corresponding to the artist's body weight. Over the course of the exhibition, the water will gradually evaporate, escaping the artist's control and being influenced solely by the climate of the exhibition space.

The works of Amankulov and Celestino thus also provide insights into the artistic spectrum in dealing with the before and after of an exhibition. They address the institutional conditions under which art is created and simultaneously reveal their limits. *Mirage* subtly questions our perception of art and the expectations associated with it. The moments of reflection manifest not only as optical effects but also as multifaceted artistic concepts that reflect the different perspectives and life stories of the artists. Similarly, *Mirage* invites the audience to develop their personal approach to the presented works.

Inspired by the works of Gleb Amankulov, participants in the workshop will have the opportunity to design and create their own artworks using everyday objects. Kitchen utensils, small furniture pieces, tools, office supplies—everything is allowed. Participants are also welcome to bring their own finds from flea markets, the streets, or their own homes. But don't worry: after documenting the creations, the artworks can be dismantled, and the objects returned to their normal use.

In addition, participants will get a rare glimpse into typically hidden spaces like the Kunstverein's workshop, where they can search for objects to use in their creations. At the end of the workshop, the artworks will be photographed, and each participant will take home a Polaroid photo as a keepsake.

Philipp Fleischmann (*1985 Hollabrunn, lives and works in Vienna)

Fleischmann has been artistic director of the Friedl Kubelka School for Independent Film, Vienna, since 2014. He studied at the Academy of Fine Arts Vienna, the Royal Danish Academy of Fine Arts and the Friedl Kubelka School for Independent Film. His work has been exhibited and honoured internationally at film festivals and exhibition spaces, including: Salzburger Kunstverein, Secession Vienna, Vienna Film Museum, Berlin International Film Festival, Toronto International Film Festival, Mumok Vienna, Diagonale Film Festival, Viennale Film Festival, International Rotterdam Film Festival, São Paulo Biennial, Biennale de Lyon.

Wisrah C. V. da R. Celestino (*1989, Buritizeiro) lives and works in many places.

Through score, sculpture, text, photography, sound and video, the artist explores the remaining structures of the transatlantic colonial project, focussing on institutional critique, language and objecthood. In 2023, they completed postgraduate studies at the Braunschweig University of Art.

Their work has been shown internationally, including at: Kunsthalle Bremen, Kunsthal Charlottenborg, Copenhagen, Kadist, France, Museu Nacional da República, Curitiba Biennial and Pampulha Art Museum, Brazil.

Celestino has received numerous awards, including the ars viva Prize for Fine Arts 2025 and the Braunschweig Projects of the State of Lower Saxony, Germany, the Pampulha Grant, Brazil.

Everson's work includes street photography, printmaking, sculpture and film. He is Professor and Director of Studio Art at the University of Virginia. Everson studied at the University of Akron and Ohio University, Athens.

His works and films have been presented at the Whitney Museum of American Art, New York, the Tate Modern, London, the Centre Pompidou, Paris, the Berlinale, Berlin, the Sundance Film Festival, Utah, the Locarno, Venice and New York Film Festivals, among others. He has been honoured with the Guggenheim Fellowship, the Alpert and the Heinz Award as well as by the American Academy in Berlin.


Amankulov's practice focuses on the working conditions in art production. One theme is the precarious elements of this way of life, which he questions simultaneously with the commercialisation of art production and the fetishisation of the art object.

He studied at the Academy of Fine Arts in Vienna and at the Belarusian State Academy of Fine Arts in Minsk. His works have been exhibited at the Kunsthalle and Belvedere, Vienna, WAF Gallery, Vienna, Fffriedrich, Frankfurt, Leopold Museum and mumok, Vienna, among others.

He has received numerous grants and prizes, including from the City of Vienna, the WHW Akademija, Zagreb, the Academy of Fine Arts and the Kunsthalle Wien.
