Fiona Connor: Closed Down Clubs at the Mackey Garage Top

Opening: Friday, May 11, 2018 Exhibition on display through August 12, 2018 Open Fridays, 11AM–6PM, and by appointment

The MAK Center for Art and Architecture presents the exhibition Closed Down Clubs, a presentation of artist Fiona Connor's work mounted at the MAK Center's Mackey Garage Top in Miracle Mile.

Closed Down Clubs is a sculptural presentation of a series of freestanding doors, produced by the artist to match exactly those of a particular nightclub or small community establishment right at the moment when it ceased to exist. When a place closed, Connor would document the doors in detail and has worked with a range of fabrication techniques in their recreation. The artist frames each of these doors as a document for a lost space, entry into a place that was.

These physical pieces of the clubs acted as signage announcing their respective identities— Connor's sculptures capture their details as a piece of the past, and the artist even reproduced ephemera from the events inside (such as club flyers) and eviction notices from city authorities. Most striking are the artist's inclusion of the direct statements clubs would post on the doors advising their communities of their demise—Connor recorded and reproduced these as well.

These pieces are documents in that they are repetitions of the original doors, toeing the line between artifice and artifact. Their original construction is reenacted, as is the wear and tear and marks of use. Paper ephemera is duplicated using archival materials silk screened onto aluminum foil. The doors-cum-sculptures take on a persistent stance in the face of changing circumstance. The work presents the doors as freestanding, allowing the binary implications (in or out, locked or unlocked) to be circumnavigated as one views them in the round. Psychologically, the doors might stand for obstacles that, in this case, become objectified and pointed to as they are seen from all sides.

The majority of the doors come from closed establishments in Los Angeles, though some come from other cities like New York. Documentation of the door from a single story building at 107 Norfolk Street—formerly home to Tonic nightclub from 1998–2007, on the Lower East Side of Manhattan—was discovered by the artist while researching the building that the Lisa Cooley Gallery had taken over for an exhibition wherein in Connor participated.

The artist's motivation for this body of work stems from a process of digesting and adjusting to what goes on when things change in one's immediate environment and community beyond

one's control; the sculptures themselves enact and mirror this via the transitions an artwork goes through from when it is being worked on and developed in real time as a part of everyday creative life, to when it is finished and becomes more static and timeless.

The MAK Center will present the full series of Connor's doors in the Mackey Garage Top exhibition space at the Mackey Apartments, combining the singular modern architecture of the space with effects of Connor's sculptures: what at first seems a clean, minimal presentation soon ripples outward to viewers' own experience of cities, space, and community.

The Mackey Garage Top is located at 1137 South Cochran Avenue, L.A. 90019.

About the Artist

Fiona Connor was born in Auckland, New Zealand and lives and works in Los Angeles. Her work is shown internationally in solo and group exhibitions, most recently at the Chicago Architecture Biennial; REDCAT, Los Angeles; 1301PE, Los Angeles; Human Resources, Los Angeles; MAK Center for Art and Architecture at the Schindler House, West Hollywood; Pact, Essen, Germany; Artspace, Auckland; and Gertrude Contemporary, Melbourne. Connor was included in the first Los Angeles biennial, Made in L.A. 2012 at the Hammer Museum, and her 2010 solo show Murals and Print was the inaugural exhibition at Various Small Fires, Los Angeles. In 2010 she was a finalist for New Zealand's most prestigious contemporary art award, the Walters Prize.
