in vain: vanitas vanitatum, omnia vanitas

George Stoll's new body of work takes form in the mode of vanitas-

sixteen pictures of death and desire sifted through the artist's sympathetic

fracture. Meticuously rendered in silk organza, we peer through the surface of

corporality to glimpse at the little shadows our souls cast, or perhaps the grin

of a ghost. The almost identical Bier-like frames with fan-shaped apertures

gingerly ground the diaphane like a spirit lingering between life and death.

Taken from the book of Ecclesiastes, the exhibition's title suggests a

rebuke of a meaningless (in Old Testament terms - Godless) life. Stoll in turn

interpolates this judgement into a contemporary collective pathos. Images of

gold coins, golf courses, fleshy steaks, looted antiquities, crowns, jewels, etc.

provide a droll index of what we lust after in this life. In the afterlife (if there is

one), will there be art? Here it seems as though art is the afterlife, the

pre-existence and the now, a singularity from which we spring.
