Lodos is pleased to present *Moving Images*, a group exhibition featuring the work of Isaac De Reza, Adriana Lara, Ghislaine Leung, Michael Smith, Pilvi Takala, and Bedros Yeretzian.

Moving Images expands the notion of "video" by looking at what happens to the image once it comes unmoored—made mobile, disembodied, endlessly replicable. It also considers what this means inside today's media landscape: an accelerating, ever-multiplying network of production and circulation, where billions of users push images into the world faster than they can be parsed. In today's media ecology images circulate with unprecedented velocity, detached from stable contexts or physical supports. Mobilized through networks of reproduction, repetition, and circulation, these images appear to take on life of their own: not merely representations, but agents shaped by the systems that transmit them.

The works in the exhibition track this shift—from the "moving image" of the silver-screen to something less stable, more recursive: images that surveil, fragment, echo, rupture, or loop themselves into oblivion. Images that are aware of their own conditions—of their spectatorship, their architecture, their own jittery movement. They arrive in fragments—a baby monitor's transmission, a princess exiled, a Jack Skellington rotating in projection purgatory—charged with the logic of viral pathologies and emotional transference.

Isaac De Reza (b. 1996, CDMX, México) lives and works in Mexico City. He received a BA in Fine Art from Central Saint Martins, University of the Arts London in 2021. Recent exhibitions and performances include *Homesick*, JO-HS, Mexico City (2023); Aufrebende Künstler, Proyecto Paralelo, Mexico City (2022); Suspension Live Performance, Sadie Coles HQ, London (2022); Constructing the Mezzanine, Platform Theatre CSM, London (2019).

Adriana Lara (b. 1978, CDMX, México) Lives and works in Marseille, France. Recent solo-exhibitions include Où sont passées les gazelles?, Air de Paris (Romainville, Fr); The Future, Greenspon (New York City, USA, 2017); Eggsplotion, Air de Paris (Paris, FR, 2016), The Interesting Theory Club, Kraupa-Tuskany Zeidler (Berlin, DE, 2016); and The Club of Interesting Memories, Mexican Cultural Institute (Washington DC., US, 2017). Ghislaine Leung (b. 1980 in Stockholm, Sweden) Solo shows have been dedicated to her practice at Kunsthalle Basel (2024), Renaissance Society, Chicago (2024), Simian, Copenhagen (2023) Maxwell Graham/Essex Street in New York City (2022/2019), Ivory Tars in Glasgow (2022), Caravan in Oslo (2022), Museum Abteiberg in Mönchengladbach (2021), Ordet in Milan (2021), Cabinet in London (2021) and Künstlerhaus Stuttgart (2019) and elsewhere. Leung has recently participated in group shows at KW Institute for Contemporary Art in Berlin (2022), The Renaissance Society in Chicago (2022), anonymous gallery in New York (2022), CAPC in Bordeaux (2022), Goldsmiths CCA in London (2022), Museum moderner Kunst Stiftung Ludwig Wien in Vienna (2022), Kunstverein für die Rheinlande und Westfalen in Düsseldorf (2021), among others. Her book Partners was published by Cell Projects in 2018, her second book will be published by Divided Publishing this year. Leung lives and works in London, UK.
