Nowadays, with the growing discussion about whether a European "Union" is possible, and whether (for example) Bavaria should feel free to be Bavaria, it seems time to take a comprehensive view of the European geography and its natural (not historically accidental) elements. The peninsula was divided into its two halves, one sloping to the Atlantic, the other to what used to be the Tethys (Mediterranean, Black Sea, Caspian), and these two parts were further divided into oceanographically coherent subunits. How many such subunits to make is a matter of discretion: it was decided, for the sake of continuity with the present European Community membership of twelve, to solve the question of what next and make a quantity of 13. Therewith, a new flag. The inspiration for this approach was a Dutch artist named Linda Van Deursen: she had converted the current European flag into a circle with same-scale outlines of France, Germany, and so on, revealing how absurdly unequal and uncomparable are the present-day members. Can Luxembourg be comparable, for example, with Germany? But in ecological coherence and regional planning, the North Sea can be a unit (Einheit) as much as the Baltic, and the Levantine coast as much as the Adriatic. So, taking Europe as that peninsula extending "the Atlantic to the Urals", we divided into ocean regions. This accords with recent UN environmental law. And it allows Bavaria, which unlike the rest of present-day Germany flows to Austria and the Black Sea, to be Bavaria.

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
